In my estimation, our Lenten book group, which explored Graham Greene's novel *The Power and the Glory,* was a great success. Our discussions were well attended and lively, and I hope others enjoyed them as much as I did. Last year, we had another great series of discussions on the book, *A Post-Covid Catechesis* by Victor Lee Austin. Both sets of discussions were held on Sunday mornings after church in the memorial room. This seems to be a convenient and congenial time to do such things. I hope to keep the magic going. So: you are all cordially invited to *Holy Apostle's Sunday Morning Book Club*. While we're at it, you're invited to invite other people as well. If you have a friend, family member, or neighbor who might be interested, invite them along. They are more than welcome to come to church first, or join us afterward. There will be plenty of coffee and donuts to go around. This is a place to belong, and that means creating unique and various opportunities for people to engage.

We're starting at what I hope is a leisurely pace of one book every one or two months. Discussions will be on a Sunday during the month that (hopefully) doesn't conflict with anything else. If that schedule doesn't seem to work for us, we'll change it. It's ours and we can do what we want. As always, you can attend the discussions without reading (or finishing) the book and vice versa. We are pretty laid-back people, I think. There are certainly no book club dragons among us, which is a selling point when you invite all your bookish friends and neighbors.

T.S. Eliot famously wrote that "April is the cruelest month" so we won't discuss any books in April. April can be a reading month and we'll jump right into discussion on the first Sunday of May (second Sunday is Mother's Day, third is Vestry meeting, and fourth is Memorial Day, phew, there goes May).

I've chosen a couple of books to get started. I've also received a wonderful recommendation, which will be the June book. You can easily acquire these books online. You might try Bookshop.org, or Amazon (if you really must). I love brick and mortar bookstores, though, and I can recommend visiting Narberth Bookshop. Window Replacement Project

Last month, we let you know that the window replacement project was finally going to get started. Well, as happens with these types of things—there were some delays. But NOW you can see the evidence of the project getting underway with the dumpster and supply container that are taking up a bit of room in the parking lot.

As of this writing, we don't have a schedule in hand yet for which windows will be replaced on which days—but we'll do our best to keep you informed in the weekly "Acts of the Apostles" email as we make our way to the finish line.

In the meantime, we can tell you this:

- Architectural Windows' installation team is expected to begin replacement work during the week of April 1st.
- The entire project is expected to take about a month. Expect delays in the event of severe weather.
- The installers' work day runs from approximately 7:30am to 5pm and they will be working some weekends.
- There may be a Sunday or two when the Parish Hall is unavailable for coffee hour. Pray for gorgeous April weather so we can gather outside should that be the case.

May: The Corner that Held Them by Sylvia Townsend Warner

Sylvia Warner was a remarkable English writer and musicologist who died in the 1970s. She's most known for her super weird and witchy proto-feminist novel, *Lolly Willowes. A Corner that Held Them*, first published in 1948, is equally eccentric and unlike any novel before or after it. It is set in a convent in medieval England during a time marked by outbreaks of the Bubonic Plague. It's about the seemingly boring—but actually fascinating (no really!)—lives of the residents of the convent over the course of centuries. It's going to be a total hoot, but don't get too attached to any one character... *A Corner that Held Them* (and *Lolly Willowes*) has been reprinted in a beautiful paperback by the NYRB Classics, which is probably my favorite publishing endeavor. They really know how to make a paperback.

June: *The Science of the Good Samaritan: Thinking Bigger about Loving our Neighbors* by Emily Smith

Thanks to Rosemary Hughes for this recommendation. Emily Smith is an epidemiologist (a field close to my heart since a dear family member is also one). She's the person who was catapulted to internet fame (with all the attendant horrors) for her Facebook page, "The Friendly Neighbor Epidemiologist." She's also a Christian, and this book represents her practical, ethical, and theological thinking about the Second Great Commandment in light of her research as a scientist, and her experience of the pandemic. *The Science of the Good Samaritan* is published by Zondervan.


Discussion June 30

July: Reading Genesis by Marilynne Robinson


You read my descriptions of the first two books and began to wonder if the common thread was "terrible diseases," but that would be false. The common thread is *"incredibly smart and talented women whose written work deals with faith but does not try to silo faith and religion from all the richness and variousness of life."* Marilynne Robinson is widely acclaimed as one of America's greatest living novelists and essayists. Her books include *Housekeeping, Gilead,* and *Home.* She retired from teaching at the Iowa Writer's Workshop, after doing much to make it one of the most prestigious writing programs in the country. She is also a committed Christian and writes about her faith brilliantly. Her newest book, just published to wide acclaim, is *Reading Genesis.* It promises to be a fascinating and

rollicking interpretation of the book of Genesis that presents the text in all its richness, without falling into the fundamentalisms of either academic higher criticism, or anti-intellectual literalism with all its crazy baggage about Creation vs. Evolution and what happened to the dinosaurs. *Reading Genesis* is published by Farrar, Straus and Giroux.

Sundays in the Great Fifty Days



There are seven Sundays in Eastertide, each with it's own name. These names come from the Roman Church, Byzantine Church and our corner of Holy Mother Church. (Their connection with that Sunday Gospel may vary because of the cycle of the lectionary.)

<u>Second Sunday in Easter</u>: The name Quasimodo Sunday comes from the Introit for this Sunday. It is also know as St. Thomas Sunday or Thomas the Doubter Sunday coming from the Gospel about Thomas doubting that it is Jesus who appears to the Apostles after the Resurrection. (Also known as Low Sunday)

<u>Third Sunday in Easter</u>: This Sunday has been known as The Feast of the Holy Sepulcher and Feast of the Myrrh-Bearers, the Marys at the tomb. In some traditions it has the title of The Feast of Our Lady of the Good Shepherd.

Fourth Sunday in Easter: Good Shepherd Sunday comes from the reading "I am the Good Shepherd" and the collect exhorts us to follow where Christ leads. This has also been called Vocation Sunday - priest called to be the shepherds of the church.

<u>Fifth Sunday in Easter</u>: Cantate Domino... the Introit Sing to the Lord. Cantata Sunday. The collect calls us to recognize Christ as the Way, the Truth and the Life and again, to follow in Christ's footsteps. In the Byzantine Rite this Sunday was called Sunday of the Samaritan Woman.

<u>Sixth Sunday in Easter</u>: This is Rogation Sunday, which precedes Ascension Day. The days following this Sunday are traditionally marked by fasting, prayer and particularly the blessing of the harvest.

<u>Seventh Sunday in Easter</u>: (Sunday after the Ascension.) This was known as Sunday of the Roses a tradition dating back to Roman times through the 6th century. The collect says *I will not leave you comfortless* and the rose petals represent the tongues of fire which appeared above the Apostles heads when the Holy Spirit descends upon them.

I encourage you to read the collects of these Sundays (BCP, pages 224-226) and think about what you might name the Sundays in Easter.
