Entertaining Angels in San Antonio and (maybe) Penn Wynne

The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God.

During the last week of April, I had the honor of helping Bishop Daniel with a meeting of the Anglican Communion Compass Rose Society board. The Compass Rose Society, with Bishop Daniel as its president, provides vital support to the unity and mission of the Anglican Communion by supporting the work and programs of the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Anglican Communion Office. Translation: the Compass Rose Society funds lots of great projects around the world that not only materially helps our Anglican siblings, but also builds Christian unity.

It's a great reminder that as Episcopalians we are members of the Anglican Communion, the third largest Christian denomination in the world, with 85 million members, in 165 countries. The Compass Rose Society does an enormous amount of work to strengthen this global Communion. I was honored to do my part by facilitating a meeting of the board of directors in San Antonio, Texas.

While the focus of the society is on the international work of Anglicans, the board meeting always includes a visitation to a local church or ministry that is doing cool stuff. In San Antonio, we visited Plaza de Paz, a program of the Episcopal Diocese of West Texas. Plaza de Paz is a respite and relief center for migrants who come across the southern US border seeking asylum because of the horrendous violence in their home countries. After processing, ICE transports these folks to this facility where they are welcomed warmly, and given food, clothes, and a place to rest. They are given resources they need to contact family members and sponsors in this country and to arrange travel and accommodations. Plaza de Paz never knows how many people are coming until the buses are on their way from the border. Sometimes it is a handful, sometimes it is hundreds. I was deeply moved by the way the staff and volunteers of Plaza de Paz extend God's hospitality with dignity and grace. Sometimes their guests have been in an ICE detention facility for days, weeks, or months. And this is after being displaced from their homes and enduring a long, terrifying journey.

Capital Campaign Update

It is my pleasure to offer you the following update on the status of the Capital Campaign. First a refresher from Fr. James' note last year:

Our purpose as a Church is not to maintain a building,

it is to worship God and show God's love to our neighbors.

Our building is a valuable tool for that work. As such, it is worth investing in for that purpose.

Therefore, the Vestry has decided to launch a capital campaign this Fall (2023).

It will be a joyful opportunity for us all to invest in this place

as a place for everyone to belong.

HERE IS THE CURRENT FINANCIAL PICTURE:

With a goal of \$200,000 in pledges, to be fulfilled by December 32, 2027, a total of \$210,400 was pledged. As of April 24, 2024, \$97,596 of those pledges has already been fulfilled with over \$1,000 of additional (un-pledged) donations.

We were also awarded a \$30,000 grant from the Diocesan Growth and Development Fund to be used towards our 3 capital campaign goals.

WHAT WERE OUR GOALS AND HOW ARE WE DOING?

GOAL 1: COMPLETED (BY THE TIME YOU RECEIVE THIS NEWSLETTER)

The window installation project began on April 4TH and is scheduled to be completed on April 3OTH.

GOAL 2: COMPLETED

The Parish Hall and Memorial Room air conditioning were replaced in Fall 2023, the old systems having failed even earlier than we originally expected and slightly ahead of the request for pledges to the capital campaign. Nevertheless, the funds from the campaign for this goal were still required to cover the expense.

GOAL 3: STARTING SOON

Why do we choose to focus on a welcoming area out front? The central theme of the capital campaign is investing in a place to

The staff of Plaza de Paz frequently hear that they are the first Americans who have said or done anything kind to them since entering this country. One child from Central America asked a volunteer if all Americans hated people like her.

Plaza de Paz does not publicly reveal its location and we were asked to keep it entirely secret. That is because shelters of this type are routinely victims of violent protests and bomb threats. The state government is extremely hostile, even though it if weren't for shelters like Plaza de Paz, people fleeing violence in their home countries would have no place to go, and would simply be dumped on the streets, whether of San Antonio or other cities across the country, including Philadelphia.



For Christians, welcoming strangers, migrants, and refugees is not a partisan political issue. It is a matter of biblical obedience. Numerous passages of the Old and New Testaments command us to care for "aliens and foreigners" in our land as if they were our own family. Hebrews tells us to welcome strangers because we never know when we might be entertaining angels.

Flor Saldivar, the director of Plaza de Paz, asked if any of us would be willing to be placed on a contact list for the shelter. I volunteered personally and I signed up Holy Apostles. When Plaza de Paz has a guest in San Antonio whose ultimate destination is Philadelphia, we might be called up to offer them hospitality and help them to get on their feet in our city. I hope you're ready to entertain some angels.



The Covenant of Water by Abraham Verghese

Thanks to the Jesuits at St. Joe's and the general inattention to other cultures typical of 20th century American education, I've always believed that St. Francis Xavier brought Christianity to the Indian subcontinent in the 16th century. This epic intergenerational novel, covering 80 years in the lives of a family from South India's Malabar Coast, taught me otherwise.

The Saint Thomas Christians are a community of Indian Christians in the state of Kerala who trace their origins to the evangelistic activity of Thomas the Apostle in the 1st century. Today, one of the Saint Thomas congregations is affiliated with the self-governing South Indian province of the Anglican Communion.

The main character in The Covenant of Water is the family's matriarch, Mariamma, a Job-like figure who suffers terrible losses and grief without ever losing her faith. She frequently takes her anger and hurt to God in prayer,

scolding the Creator for earthly suffering and injustice.

Lacking in formal education, forced into an arranged marriage to a much-older man at age 12, and spending all her life in a remote area with no church, Mariamma struggles to find consolation and hope in her faith. "How can you forgive a God who takes a mother from her child?" she rages. And on the other hand, "There are certain things that God does not need to be told."

The vast scope and intricate plot of this book kept me engaged from page one through page (gulp!) 775. Verghese is a medical doctor by profession, and I admit I skimmed through some of the more gruesome descriptions of surgeries and tropical diseases. But the book also left me wanting to learn more about Indian culture and history, especially the late Colonial period and post-independence politics.

Day Retreat - Mighty Mary

In our weekly Bible Study we have been studying women of the Old Testament and are now beginning our study of women in the New Testament.

How fortuitous it was for three members of our Bible Study of our Bible Study - Katie Gentile, Margaret Paschal and myself - along with Jean Gentile, to attend a retreat on "Mighty Mary" hosted by Christ Church and St Michael's in Philadelphia on April 13th. The Reverend Pat Cashman facilitated our study of Mary using lecture, discussion, art, biblical references and music.

Along with participants from other churches we each shared how we became connected with Mary beyond the Nativity. Hearing these stories from a variety of backgrounds led to a rich discussion.

Pat then led us to examine and discuss the many roles of Mary through different lenses. We saw her through the eyes of artist Henry Ossawa Tanner in his painting "The Annunciation," which is on permanent display at the Philadelphia Museum of Art. There were a number of stained-glass windows in Christ Church and St. Michael's that pertained to our retreat topic, including one depicting Mary's role as a mother using a scroll to teach her son to read.

Rev. Cashman shared various Bible verses relating to Mary. One that stood out to me is Acts 1:14 which says, "Mary prayed with the apostles and other women." I can imagine Mary in her grief joining together with the women and the brothers of Jesus in prayer.

In our biblical reference discussions we commented on the many women named Mary. The name Mary is a form of the name Miriam, which comes from a word meaning *rebellious*. Pat surmised that girls may have been named Mary as a form of resistance to Roman rule.

Our program closed with a beautiful recording of Mary's song, *The Magnificat*, which shows how Mary magnifies the Lord by proclaiming his love, faithfulness and mercy.
